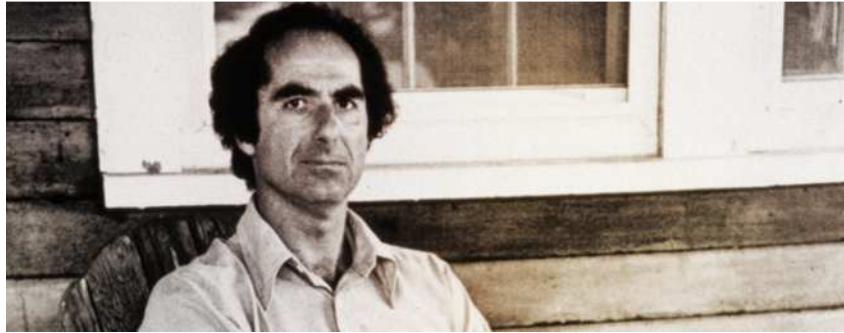


BRIAN KULICK – is author of the upcoming book *The Secret Life of Theatre*. From 2003-2017 he was the Artistic Director of Classic Stage Company (CSC) where he directed Mandy Patinkin in “The Tempest,” F. Murray Abraham in “Nathan The Wise,” and Dianne Wiest in “The Forest.” He conceived and produced CSC’s critically-acclaimed Chekhov Cycle with a constellation of artists that included Alan Cumming, Maggie Gyllenhaal, Ethan Hawke, Joely Richardson, Peter Sarsgaard, John Turturro, and Dianne Wiest.

He made CSC a home for the plays of David Ives whose “Venus in Fur” went onto Broadway and was nominated for a Tony Award for Best Play. For the past 16 years, he has been teaching at Columbia University’s School of the Arts.

In conjunction with the vibrant 2018 New York City fall dance season, Balanchine ballerina Heather Watts leads an exploration of ballets being featured this autumn at New York City Ballet, American Ballet Theatre, and New York City Center's new "Balanchine Festival." This Seminar will look at an exciting range of repertory through the lens of music, dance structure, and the context of the time each work was created -- as well as how we observe each ballet today. Special focus will be given to examining the iconic roles in each ballet, as danced by their original performers, and by famous latter-day interpreters. **Video will be used.**

HEATHER WATTS joined New York City Ballet in 1970 and was one of the last of the famed Balanchine Ballerinas. Watts worked closely with George Balanchine and Jerome Robbins at NYCB and was an acclaimed international ballet star retiring from the stage in 1995. Watts is a contributing editor at Vanity Fair magazine. She has created academic courses on Balanchine's life and work at Harvard University and Visiting Lecturer in Dance at Princeton University in 2012. She was an inaugural fellow at the Institute of Ballet, NYU in 2014. Watts received a Doctorate in Fine Arts *honoris causa* from Hunter College.

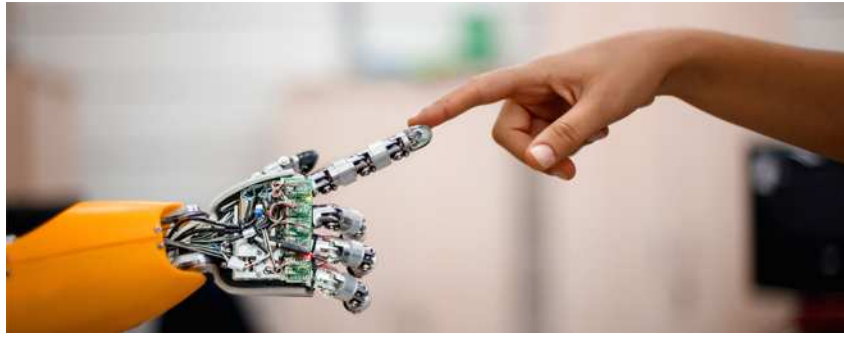

SCANDALS IN AMERICAN POLITICAL HISTORY

This Seminar will examine political scandals in American history up to the current day. It will begin by examining the issue of corruption in late 19th and early 20th century American politics, before moving on to discuss the re-emergence of scandal in the post-World War II period. Ethical transgressions in the 1960s, 1970s, and 1990s will be explored, with the Seminar concluding by analyzing the myriad scandals that dominate U.S. politics today.

His most recent publication is the edited *Asia Pacific in the Age of Globalization*, published by Palgrave/MacMillan; and he has been selected by Oxford University Press to edit its forthcoming *Oxford History Handbook of American Foreign Relations*.
